

**MINUTES OF THE CITY COUNCIL
OF THE CITY OF FONTANA
REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING
September 13, 2016**

WORKSHOP:

A. 5:30 P.M. Joint City Council and Planning Commission Workshop

A Joint Fontana City Council and Planning Commission Workshop was held on Tuesday, September 13, 2016 in the Fontana City Hall Executive Conference Room, 8353 Sierra Avenue, Fontana, California. The Workshop was called to order by Mayor Warren at 5:30 p.m., with Mayor Pro Tem Salazar-Wibert, Council Members Roberts, Tahan and Sandoval present.

Planning Commission Chair Garcia and Planning Commissioners Meyer, Quiroga, Gongora and Sanchez were present.

Engineering Department Administrative Analyst and ATP Project Manager Monique Reza introduced California Transportation Department (Caltrans) Representative Rebecca Forbes, and Alta Planning and Design Consultant Connery Cepeda. Ms. Reza presented the Active Transportation Plan (ATP). Discussion ensued regarding the elements that would be covered in the ATP and what type of surveys would be conducted. The Fontana City Council Agenda was reviewed and City Manager Comments were heard.

PUBLIC COMMUNICATION:

Due to a lengthy Closed Session, Mayor Warren announced that public comments would be limited to one minute per speaker.

Ms. Tressy Capps, Fontana Citizen Action Committee (FCAC), complained that she spent a hour in traffic driving her niece to Etiwanda High School. She suggested that Wilson Avenue in Rancho Cucamonga be looked at because no one used the bike lane. Ms. Capps added that 80% of Fontana's kids were going to Etiwanda High School and that the City needed more car-centric planning.

Ms. Tressy Capps, FCAC member, submitted correspondence dated August 13, 2016 regarding a position on Council Redistricting in Fontana, which was in response to correspondence received from the law firm of Shenkman & Hughes, to be discussed in Closed Session. The FCAC's position was to request that the City Council find out the motive, defend false accusations and claims, no redistricting in advance of litigation and threat.

CALL TO ORDER/ROLL CALL:

A. 7:00 P.M. Call the Meeting to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Fontana City Council was held on Tuesday, September 13, 2016, in the Grover W. Taylor Council Chambers at 8353 Sierra Avenue, Fontana, California. Mayor Warren called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m.

ROLL CALL:

Present: Mayor Warren, Mayor Pro Tem Salazar-Wibert, and Council Members Roberts, Tahan and Sandoval.

Absent: None.

INVOCATION/PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:

Following the Invocation by Police Department Chaplain Gregory Peck, the Pledge of Allegiance was led by Mayor Pro Tem Salazar-Wibert.

CLOSED SESSION ANNOUNCEMENT:

City Attorney Jeff Ballinger announced that there was no reportable action on the Closed Session Items.

PROCLAMATIONS:

A. National Public Lands Day

Mayor Warren and the City Council proclaimed September 24, 2016 as National Public Lands Day. Community Services Coordinator Rick Dean was present to accept.

B. National Senior Center Month

Mayor Warren and the City Council proclaimed September 2016 as National Senior Center Month. Community Services Supervisor Tiffany Starks introduced Senior Center Advisory Board Chair Kathy Potts and Senior Center Board Member Betty Sandoval, who were present to accept.

SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS:

A. Police Department Swearing In Ceremony

Mayor Warren and the City Council swore in new Fontana Police Officers' Dustin Hodgins, Corey Hostetter and Guillermo Bermudez. Police Officers Hodgins, Hostetter and Bermudez introduced their families and thanked the Mayor and City Council.

B. Report on the Sunset on Sierra Event

Administrative Analyst Monique Reza introduced Ms. Julia Lippe-Klein, Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) representative. Ms. Lippe-Klein presented the successful implementation of Fontana's Sunset on Sierra, an open streets and active transportation infrastructure demonstration project, coordinated in partnership with Go Human and the Fontana Arts Festival, that attracted an estimated 8,000 people on Saturday, July 30, 2016.

PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS:

A. Public Communications

Mr. Ted Hunt, Fontana Police Officers' Association, along with Ms. Deborah Hall Lindsey and Ms. Ellen Turner, Concerned Citizens for the Development of North Fontana, spoke on the Chillin and Grillin Barbeque Cook Off, and that the purpose of the event was to build trust between the Police Department and the community. Mr. Hunt recognized the Concerned Citizens for the Development of North Fontana, Fontana Police Officers Association, and the City of Fontana for their support of the event and thanked all the

sponsors and staff. Ms. Lindsey gave a big thanks to everyone.

Ms. Tressy Capps, Toll Free I.E., spoke on taxes and the upcoming election and that the Etiwanda School District would be imposing a 25-year tax that would be placed on new property taxes, which would affect everyone in the district, including renters. She summarized that Measure I were not taxes that Etiwanda School District was trying to impose and that they had plenty of money. Ms. Capps referred to a letter from Etiwanda School District regarding a bond issue, and also referred to an article in the Fontana Herald News that she wrote. She asked that everyone vote "No" on Measure I.

Ms. Darlene Scalf, Fontana citizen, spoke on the following: (1) National Public Lands Day and was concerned that there were no parks in the poorest part of town. She added that \$6 million was to be spent on the amphitheater, which could be used for two new parks; (2) that the City consider not having Fontana Days in June because of the hot weather and that schools were still in session; and (3) regarding the Fontana Woman's Club would like to find out about the \$10,000 that was given to the club and how it was spent.

City Clerk Tonia Lewis read correspondence into the record, dated September 9, 2016, from Mr. Frank Ellis, regarding a No Stopping Zone on the west side of Oleander Avenue, which was counter productive to dropping off and picking up students for school.

Mr. Mike Baca, Fontana resident, asked whether Alder Avenue and Jurupa Avenue were to be fixed. He added that he had previously requested that a stop sign be placed on the north east side of Alder Avenue, but it was placed on east side of Jurupa Avenue. Mayor Warren referred Mr. Baca to Engineering Director Ricardo Sandoval for follow up.

Ms. Chris Huett, March of Dimes representative, announced that they had partnered with Fontana Unified School District and that November 17th was World Prematurity Day. She added that all schools would be painting their school purple to raise awareness of the concerns of preterm births and the concerns of their families.

Pastor Daniel Vasquez, Calvary Chapel-Summit Church, invited the Mayor and City Council and citizens, to their services that were held every Sunday, at 10:00 a.m. at Summit High School. Pastor Vasquez also spoke on the many services that his church provided to the community.

Mr. Dale Radford, 72-year Fontana resident, was concerned that a group of people beginning with the Boys & Girls Club, Fontana Woman's Club, Rotary Club and Fontana Chamber of Commerce, wanted to run the City. He stated that the City may be going the same way as the cities of Beaumont, Bell and Upland. Mr. Radford added that the City Manager had asked for direction from the City Council and wanted the City Manager to do his job.

Ms. Deborah Hall Lindsey, Concerned Citizens for the Development of North Fontana, previously provided her public comments.

Bishop Emory James, Ephesians New Testament Church, spoke on the 2017 Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration, and wanting to include students so that they may obtain a full experience for the Martin Luther King celebration. Bishop James announced that he had

an initial commitment from Mr. Marty King, Dr. King's son, for the worship service. He added that they were in the process of soliciting sponsors for the 30-year celebration, and was requesting a grant of \$12,000 to help defray the cost, which would be a one-time grant to help with the cost. Bishop James mentioned a booklet that had been prepared that explained what they had done during the year.

Council Member Tahan stated that the item needed to be agendaized for discussion.

Mayor Warren stated that the City had a process and that the item could be discussed at a later time.

Council Member Tahan stated that the event was to be held in January 2017 and the item needed to be discussed soon.

Mayor Warren suggested that during Elected Officials' comments that the item could be brought up.

Mr. Eddie McCloud, candidate for City Council, spoke on the following items: (1) the order of candidates' names on the ballot and that his name was listed last, (2) Fontana Woman's Club and that Mr. Phil Cothran was a businessman; (3) when the City Council would be taking money from the Fontana Water Company and then the rates would be raised; (4) the City Manager made more money than the President of the United States and that he was doing an awesome job but that he had an assistant that did not make more than the President of the United States; (5) there are many people on the ballot which showed that there are changes that were needed; and lastly, (6) that homes were to be built but without the needed infrastructure and that the kids would be stuffed into classrooms.

Ms. Fran Givens, Senior Advocate, spoke on the following items: (1) that the sidewalk was being fixed and her residents were very happy about it; (2) that National Senior Center Month was very important because the City had a lot of people who would be turning 80 years old; (3) mentioned that the first senior center was on Marygold Avenue, Dino Papavero Senior Center, which had been built for the steelworkers, and that Mr. Papavero had been the President of the Steelworkers Association; (4) more housing for the elderly was needed, such as, senior apartments, because they should not live in assisted living facilities because their Medicare checks go to the facility and that the person had no control over their own finances; and lastly, (5) a senior center provided many services and resources and also provided transportation. Ms. Givens added that her mother was 92 and played the piano at the Dino Papavero Senior Center and she also did calisthenics.

Mr. Peter Garcia invited the Mayor and City Council to the Fontana Unified School District Board meeting on Wednesday, August 14, 2016, 6:30 p.m. regarding registered sex offenders being allowed on campus, who are parents of children who attend the schools.

CONSENT CALENDAR:

Adding Late Breaking Item to the September 13, 2016 Agenda

Mayor Warren announced that the City Council had an item to discuss and take possible

action regarding the addition of a Late Breaking Item to the September 13, 2016 Agenda. The item was to consider approving Amendment No. 1 to the Cooperative Agreement with Caltrans for Construction of the Line "A" Storm Drain Project. In order to do so, the Council must determine, by a 4/5 vote, that this item came to their attention after the agenda was posted, and that item cannot wait for the next regularly scheduled Council meeting.

City Attorney Jeff Ballinger provided some background and findings.

ACTION: Motion was made by Council Member Sandoval, seconded by Council Member Tahan, and passed unanimously by a vote of 5-0 to add a late breaking item by a 4/5 vote to the September 13, 2016 Agenda, by finding that this item came to their attention after the agenda was posted and that the item cannot wait until the next regularly scheduled meeting (AYES: Warren, Salazar-Wibert, Roberts, Tahan and Sandoval; NOES: None).

Mayor Warren inquired whether the approval of Amendment No. 1 to the Cooperative Agreement with Caltrans for Construction of the Line "A" Storm Drain Project may be added to the Consent Calendar on the Regular Meeting Agenda. City Attorney Ballinger responded in the affirmative.

ACTION: Motion was made by Council Member Roberts, seconded by Council Member Sandoval, and passed unanimously by a vote of 5-0 to approve Consent Calendar Items "CC-A through CC-N" and to approve and authorize the Mayor to execute the revised Funding Summary for the Cooperative Agreement 08-614 with Caltrans for the Construction of the Line "A" Storm Drain Project at Duncan Canyon and the I-15 Freeway (AYES: Warren, Salazar-Wibert, Roberts, Tahan and Sandoval; NOES: None) as follows:

PUBLIC HEARINGS:

A. Amend the Fontana Municipal Code to Reflect the New Definition of "Infill" and Adopt a Resolution Reflecting the New Definition as it Applies to the Reduction of Specific Development Impact Fees

Mayor Warren opened Public Hearing Item PH-A.

Development Services Deputy City Manager Debbie Brazill provided the staff report.

Council Member Tahan asked whether the 50% reduction was solely the development impact fee.

Deputy City Manager Brazill stated that the reduction did not impact Measure I funds or Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) pass thru fees.

No one else spoke in favor or opposition.

The Public Hearing was closed.

ACTION: Motion was made by Council Member Tahan, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Salazar-Wibert, and passed unanimously by a vote of 5-0 to adopt Public Hearing Item A-1 and A-2 (AYES: Warren, Salazar-Wibert, Roberts, Tahan and Sandoval; NOES: None) as follows:

1. Determine that this activity has been reviewed pursuant to Section 15378 of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) in that this ordinance and resolution are not projects because there is no potential for resulting in physical change in the environment and where it can be seen with absolute certainty that there is no possibility that the proposals will have a significant effect on the environment, the activities are not subject to CEQA and, therefore, a Notice of Exemption will be filed.

2. Waive further reading of and introduce **Ordinance No. 1748**, an Ordinance of the City of Fontana amending Section 30-11 of the Fontana Municipal Code to reflect the new definition of "infill" and that the reading of the title constitutes the first reading thereof.

ACTION: Motion was made by Council Member Roberts, seconded by Council Member Sandoval, and passed unanimously by a vote of 5-0 to adopt Public Hearing Item PHA-3 (AYES: Warren, Salazar-Wibert, Roberts, Tahan and Sandoval; NOES: None) as follows:

3. Adopt **Resolution No. 2016-081** of the City of Fontana reflecting the new definition of "infill" as it applies to the reduction of specific development impact fees and rescinding Resolution No. 2007-08 regarding the same.

ELECTED OFFICIALS COMMUNICATIONS/REPORTS:

A. Elected Officials Communications/Committee Reports

City Treasurer Koehler-Brooks thanked everyone that was involved in the 9-11 Event and that the event had been wonderful and moving.

City Clerk Lewis stated the following: (1) that she appreciated City Manager Hunt and that he worked seven days a week; (2) complimented Community Services Department and the North Fontana residents for the Grillin & Chillin Event and that the event had been so much fun and hoped that the event would be held annually; and (3) that the 9-11 Event had been so warm hearted and beautiful.

Council Member Tahan thanked the North Fontana group and Police Officer groups for the Chillin & Grillin event.

Council Member Tahan stated that discussion about sponsorships was worthwhile to determine whether we could partner on it.

Council Member Tahan stated that the political season was here and talked about taking sides on issues during the political season and the postings on Facebook, on whether one was with them or not. Mr. Tahan stated that the City Council was not the only one who could say how this community should go. He added that he had many friends in

the community and talked to everyone in the community. He stated that there are people who can do a good job for the City and that respecting friendships in the community was very important.

Council Member Tahan announced that he had attended the International Council of Shopping Centers (ICSC) in San Diego, California.

Council Member Sandoval concurred with Council Member Tahan's comments.

Council Member Sandoval welcomed his grandson, Sebastian, and his daughter who were visiting from Florida.

Council Member Sandoval announced that he had attended ICSC in San Diego, California.

Council Member Sandoval announced the March of Dimes event and stated that his grandson had been born prematurely. Mr. Sandoval stated that he would like to see whether the Public Works staff could have some lighting in purple to show support.

Council Member Sandoval announced that he had attended the Chillin & Grillin Barbeque and that the event had brought the community together. Mr. Sandoval stated that we needed to stay together as a community and to talk to each other.

Council Member Sandoval stated that the City Council had not granted a jet to the City Manager, so that he could take off any time he wanted. The President of the United States has a jet and an army at his disposal. The City was well run, and at one time was close to bankruptcy, but that the City Council had worked together. Mr. Sandoval added that there is accountability and that the community needed to hold them accountable.

Council Member Sandoval stated that he could not force anyone to provide him information and that he had to accept the information that was provided to him.

Council Member Sandoval stated that Fontana Days needed to go back to the parade and celebrate the birth of the City, and to have the schools, City and residents march together.

Council Member Roberts announced that he had attended ICSC in San Diego, California and found the conference to be extremely productive.

Council Member Roberts stated that Council Members Tahan and Sandoval looked at both sides of an issue.

Council Member Roberts stated that he appreciated Mr. Ted Hunt and his group and Ms. Ellen Turner and her group for bringing people together in the community, and especially appreciated the Police Department because they had made a lot of progress.

Council Member Roberts stated that he agreed with Council Member Sandoval's comments about getting the schools back involved in Fontana Days and have them be a viable part of the parade.

Council Member Roberts stated that he appreciated the Fire and Police Departments and Community Services Department for the 9-11 Event and that it had been a great event. Mr. Roberts added that it had been the 15th Anniversary of 9-11 and that 9-11 was equivalent to the event that occurred at Pearl Harbor.

Council Member Roberts stated that the City has a leader, who has been the longest-serving City Manager in the City, but also the longest-serving City Manager in the County. He added that he has been a leader on the financial side and helped make things viable in the City, by refinancing bonds, which assisted property values that had negative values, and now there is a viable area where it once was not. Mr. Roberts stated that the community centers and parks happened with good planning and good leadership. He added that it was very easy to criticize someone that made more money, but that City Manager Hunt was looked up to by other cities as a leader in San Bernardino County and that he was worth his weight in gold.

Mayor Pro Tem Salazar-Wibert stated that being representatives of the public also meant being accountable to the public. She added that the City Council had asked for audits and that the information could be provided to the public.

City Manager Hunt asked whether that was the direction of the City Council.

Mayor Warren inquired whether the public wanted a copy. City Manager Hunt stated that it is a public record.

Mayor Warren stated that all the results of the audits should be compiled by the City Manager. City Manager Hunt stated that the item can be placed on the agenda or the information can be placed at the front counter.

Mayor Pro Tem Salazar-Wibert thanked Community Services and Public Works staff and stated that the departments were dynamic.

Mayor Pro Tem Salazar-Wibert thanked the Fire and Police Departments and had really appreciated the 9-11 Event, and that it was near and dear to her heart.

Mayor Pro Tem Salazar-Wibert thanked Caroline at the Arts Program and that it had been very well attended. She added that it had been a lot of fun and the seniors had done a very good job.

Mayor Pro Tem Salazar-Wibert asked that everyone continue to support law enforcement, fire department, school police and our military families.

Mayor Warren announced that she had attended ICSC in San Diego, California and thanked Deputy City Managers Debbie Brazill and David Edgar and Code Compliance Manager Ted Porlas for the event.

Mayor Warren gave special thanks to the Fontana Police Officers Association, who had the vision to work with the Concerned Citizens for the Development of North Fontana group.

Mayor Warren announced that the Water of Life event had been helpful and that great information and comments about the community had been obtained.

Mayor Warren announced that the Chillin & Grillin Event and Barbeque had been great and that the food had been spectacular.

Mayor Warren announced that Mr. Isaiah Cooper, a young African American from Compton, who flew solo across the United States at 15-years of age, was present at the Chilin and Grillin event.

Mayor Warren stated that she had a great conversation with the Police and Fire Departments about how we could recruit more people of color.

Mayor Warren announced that the Concerned Citizens for the Development of North Fontana had done a great job and that the event would be held annually and thanked all the sponsors.

Mayor Warren thanked the Community Services Department, and Fire and Police Departments for the 9-11 Event, and announced that everyone who had attended the event felt very proud to be Americans. Mayor Warren mentioned that the 9-11 Event had been taped by KFON.

Mayor Warren announced that the Fontana Day at the Fair would be held at the L. A. County Fair on Friday, September 16, 2016, and that the reception and parade would begin at 3:00 p.m. Mayor Warren added that Veteran Posts 272 and 262 and VFW 365, would be honored.

Mayor Warren announced the Mayor's Gala to be held on October 1, 2016 and that every dime donated would benefit the Fontana Boys & Girls Club. Tickets were on sale for \$50/person.

Mayor Warren stated that during election season people do express themselves, and by doing so, they let the City Council know their feelings on certain topics.

Mayor Warren stated that the City Manager manages 1,100 full and part-time employees, and that she really appreciated her colleagues' comments about the City Manager. Mayor Warren stated that the community deserved a good City Manager to oversee the community, and added that the community was blessed because they could afford a qualified City Manager.

Mayor Warren announced that the community was one Fontana whether everyone agreed with one another or not, and that everyone needed to work together and that she appreciated everyone's comments.

City Manager Ken Hunt addressed the following items: (1) that the City Council gave


